recent flying choir tour to Beijing and Shanghai gave a glimpse of music and life in China's two major cities - each containing roughly the entire population of Canada.

Most press gives star billing to the major "starchitect"-designed concert halls, and they were certainly spectacular. The National Centre for the Performing Arts in Beijing sits close to the official centre of the City. By day, a shiny oval reflects in the surrounding moat. By night, the surface glows with lights outlining the major constellations.



The auditorium in blonde wood, with red upholstered seats surrounding the stage, held a huge organ with a complete 64-foot open diapason (which certainly made itself felt when played with the orchestra!).

We also sang in an older hall with simpler facilities and more restrained decor but superb acoustics, with another concert organ. We also saw a number of other rehearsal centres and large music schools.

Ticket prices seemed steep, but there were good-sized audiences. Whether common

practice or the result of a mix-up, there were no programs for most of the concerts, which made it interesting to note that generally the audience responded most enthusiastically for many of the same pieces that get the biggest response here, as well as for Matthew Larkin's performance of a Willan organ solo. Checking your e-mail during the performance seemed to be an accepted practice. In Shanghai, however, the ushers tried to stop people who actually took calls on their phones, or took flash photos.

There didn't seem to be as much muzak in public places as there would be here, i.e. in stations, at patios, in restaurants. Many stores had speakers outdoors, but they broadcast sales pitches rather than music. In Shanghai, the street sweepers played 'Happy Birthday" as they passed (and they moved almost as fast as regular traffic).

In such busy cities, the parks seemed always busy, grandparents and toddlers by day, parents and school-children in the evening. Here, music in the park almost always means a rummage or craft sale. There, the music would be just as loud, but usually accompanying line dancing (or less often) ballroom dancing. Or, in another corner, one might see a group singing along, accompanied on a portable keyboard, following the words on a poster held up by one of their number. Very occasionally, quieter music (sometimes even just a flute) would be playing for a group doing tai chi.

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Member of the Year – Rev. Dr. Dan Hansen

We are pleased to announce that Rev. Dr. Daniel Hansen, ThD, MDiv, GrDip, BMus and our Professional Support Convenor, will be recognized as the Ottawa Centre Member of the Year for 2016. Daniel has held the position of Professional Support for many years and has provided his time, expertise and support to many members of our Centre.

A native of Stratford, Ontario, Dan graduated with an undergraduate degree in church music from the world-renowned Westminster Choir College in Princeton, N.J.(1982). Returning to Canada, he went on to do advanced music performance studies in organ with John Tuttle and Bernard Lagacé, and received a diploma from Concordia University (Montreal).

In 1984, he was the winner of the Leslie Bell Prize for Choral Conducting, an annual competition managed by the Ontario Arts Council. This enabled him to study with Helmuth Rilling at the Oregon Bach Festival. He also studied orchestral conducting at the Royal Conservatory of Music (Toronto), and was selected to train as a choral conductor with Wayne Riddell (Tudor Singers) and John Washburn (Vancouver Chamber Choir), supported by the Canada Council.

His experience as a church musician in various denominations led him to studies in theology, completing a master's degree in divinity from Emmanuel College (Victoria University of the University of Toronto) and then, returning to the U.S.A. a doctorate in theology from Boston University School of Theology (1998). His doctoral dissertation was on the perceived and actual identity of the church musician in the United Church of Canada.

After serving for many years as a church musician in Canada and the U.S.A., Dan was ordained as a minister by the Toronto Conference of the United Church (1997). Since that time, he has trained as an educational supervisor for ministers-in-training, a spiritual director (Haden Institute), and as an intentional interim minister (Interim Ministry Network).



As an ordained minister, Dan serves the Zion-Mt. Zion Pastoral Charge of the United Church of Canada, which includes two Pembroke churches (Zion Evangelical United and Mt. Zion United). He enjoys writing a weekly essay (Thursdays) for the Pembroke Daily Observer, where readers can be challenged regarding how faith meets life, and by raising important questions.

As a therapist, Dan was recently promoted to advanced candidate status with the Ontario Association of Jungian Analysts (OAJA). He has a private practice in Renfrew for Jungian analysis, as well as psychological and spiritual counselling.

Dan is a member of Spiritual Directors International (SDI), the Canadian Association of Psychodynamic Therapy (CAPT), the Royal Canadian College of Organists (RCCO), Societas Liturgica (SL), and the North American Academy of Liturgy (NAAL).

He moved to the Ottawa Valley in 2003, and calls Renfrew home. Since then, he has been working as the professional support person for the Ottawa Centre (RCCO), a position which utilizes his musical, spiritual, and psychological background in an educational context. He is also a frequent contributor to the centre's monthly newsletter Pipelines.

Dan is the co-parent of two teenage boys, Drew and Luke, and the owner of Greta, a long-haired, miniature dachshund.







Maurice Clerc Concert Review

April 25th, the final concert of the Pro Organo Season was given by Maurice Clerc at Église Saint-François-d'Assise on the Guilbault-Thérien (1989) organ. Maurice Clerc studied with Gaston Litaizie and Pierre Cochereau at the International Academy in Nice. He won the Improvisation Prize in 1977 at the international competition in Lyon. In 1972, he was appointed titular organist of Saint-Bénigne Cathedral in Dijon. M. Clerc presented a very interesting and varied programme which showed the many colours of this fine organ in such a wonderful acoustic.

He opened with his own transcription of Jean-Joseph Mouret's *Symphonies de Fanfare*. The three movements utilized many colourful registrations ending with the *Final* in a grand style of repeated chords. The Benedetto Marcello *Andante du concerto en Ut mineur* utilized wonderful flutes with the lyrical sound of the Tierce on the Great. The piece had such clarity and charm.

J.S. Bach works very well on this organ and M. Clerc played the *Prelude et Fugue en Si mineur (BWV 544)* at a stately pace with excellent technique. The Fugue began more softly on the Swell and moved to the Great with a full sound at the end. The highlight for me was M. Clerc's performance of César Franck's sensitive treatment of *Pièce Héroïque*. He utilized the Swell box for dynamic and echo effects and the reeds provided the right colours for the lyrical sections.

Two very different pieces by Louis Vierne were on the programme. *Méditation* (an improvisation reconstituée par Maurice Duruflé) is a quiet piece utilizing foundations and flutes and ending with soft strings. By contrast, the *Allegro de la 2me symphonie* has a dramatic chordal introduction and many fast passages including a lovely quiet section on the Swell and of course ending with a great crescendo.

The second half included a transcription for organ by M. Clerc of Gabriel Fauré's *Trois pieces de Dolly*. Fauré wrote the *Dolly Suite for piano* *duet* around 1894, dedicating it to Emma Bardac's daughter Hélène, known as "Dolly". The *Berceuse* has the typical Fauré lyricism which M. Clerc brought out on the lovely flutes of this organ. To me, the *Kitty-valse* sounded like a barrel-organ

-Improvisation sur 'Victimae Paschali Laudes' (improvisation reconstituée par Maurice Duruflé). This piece is based on an Easter chant and is wonderful to hear in a large building such as this. The build-up to the final chords was carefully measured



and the *Pas espagnol* with its syncopated rhythms and flashy reed effects definitely had a Spanish flair.

Two works followed by Jean Langlais. M. Clerc's treatment of *La Nativité* showed off many interesting and beautiful sounding registrations of quieter stops with lovely singing pedal solos. The *Te Deum* was clear and strident where one expects it. I would have appreciated slightly more space between sections to let the sound clear in this live acoustic.

The programme concluded with Charles Tournemire *Choral*

for effect at the end.

It was clear from the applause and standing ovation that the audience appreciated the programme and performance by M. Clerc. Jeremiah Clarke's *Trumpet Voluntary* was well received as the encore. Thanks to Église Saint-François-d'Assise and Gilles Leclerc for providing this venue for the concert. There are several RCCO members who help to make this wonderful series happen year after year, but a very special thank you to Karen Holmes who spends countless hours organizing this series from start to finish.
