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his month brings the Great Bach Marathon to Ottawa. During the afternoon of April 22^{nd} , over forty students and teachers, organists, pianists, string players and choristers will explore and celebrate the music of J.S. Bach (see page 2 for more details).

Surely this will be an event for all the participants, both performers and listeners, to enjoy, but it is also a public expression of what should be the everyday role of our Centre and College. We work together to support and encourage students, teachers, leaders, performers and active listeners, to promote the organ, the instrument we love, and to fulfill these roles as part of the wider musical community. The Marathon will be an opportunity to show the whole City the work that we do and the strength of our organ community.

Bach's music is an obvious starting point for a Marathon, but what better model do we

have of the goals of the College than Bach's own career? While few of us would claim his personal combination of innate talent, technical skill, energy, soul and learned conviction, we all share as a community the tasks that he undertook, with the results that will be demonstrated at the Marathon.

Bach taught both children and adults, beginners and professionals,

and was famous as a performer and improviser. Having secured his position as Cantor in Leipzig he threw himself into composing for the church, and into organizing the music for the City churches, using the professional and amateur forces he could round up. He was an active member of the musical community and in later years arranged and composed music for the City's orchestra and chorus of largely amateur musicians. We might even note that Bach enjoyed travelling to hear others perform, even when he professed to despise the music in question.

Our Great Bach Marathon is a great opportunity to show who we are and what we do to the City and to our colleagues in the musical community at large. It also raises the question of what the Centre and College should be doing to meet its goals and ensure that a continuing enthusiastic organ community will be able to hold future Marathons.

The sanctuary of Woodroffe United Church will be filled with excited young people and passionate more experienced folk. Please join us as we support our colleagues with our presence and caring. Anthony King-Douglas Gibson Scholarship and Allen Cureton Scholarship

The funds can contribute toward the cost of attending an RCCO convention, but must be applied to an organized course or event; not to be used for private lessons. Kiwanis Festival Scholarship

The Ottawa Centre offers a \$500 organ scholarship through the annual Kiwanis Festival of Music and Dance.





The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship was established in memory of the late Godfrey Hewitt, C.D., D.Mus. (Cantuar), FRCO, Hon. ARSCM. Its purpose is to provide an annual scholarship of \$5,000 to an advanced Canadian organ student (or landed immigrant in Canada) who wishes to pursue courses of study either at a university or with a particular teacher, either within Canada or abroad. Funds may be used for tuition, travel, living expenses, and such other purposes as may be appropriate to the circumstances of the award.

Required repertoire for the following spring's competition and other requirements can be found on the Centre website: www.rcco.ca/scholinfo.html. All applicants shall satisfy the following requirements:

Canadian citizenship, or landed



immigrant status in Canada;

- aged 35 years or less;
- graduate, or about to graduate from university, conservatory or college;
- RCCO Associate diploma or similar academic level of qualification;
- stated intention of teaching organ (either in an academic institution or privately, not necessarily as the candidate's primary career).

Deadline for submissions is April 30th, 2017. The Godfrey Hewitt Memorial Scholarship of \$5,000 has been awarded annually to advanced Canadian organ students each year since 2005.

National Office Scholarships

The Lorna and Murray Holmes Scholarship

The Lorna Holmes Scholarship is available annually, and provides \$1,000 to a student entering organ or church music studies at a Canadian University. Preference will be given to students beginning undergraduate studies. Applicants must hold membership in the College. A letter of application must be accompanied by a proof of acceptance at a Canadian university, and two letters of reference from people able to assess the candidate's suitability for the scholarship. The Clifford McAree Scholarship

The scholarship of \$1000 will be awarded annually to allow a student to attend an Organ Festival of the RCCO. This scholarship will give the chosen student a chance to attend workshops, listen to exceptional organ performances, and start the essential process of networking with other organists. It may be used for any expenses associated with attending such an event (e.g. registration fee, transportation, meals, accommodation, etc.)

The applicant must be enrolled in a programme leading to a degree in organ performance. The applicant may reside anywhere in Canada.

Jonathan Oldengarm Concert Review BLAKE HARGREAVES

onathan Oldengram gave a performance at the beautiful Cathedral Basilique Notre-Dame February 24th, in celebration of Canada's 150th anniversary. His program of Canadian works was as colourful and historical as the building itself. The Basilica's Guilbault-Thérien-renovated Casavant organ delivered its incredible variety of sounds beautifully. Oldengarm's articulation and rhythmic precision gave a crystal clear view of the composers' intent with atypical works, and his tasteful registrations showcased the dynamism of this historic instrument.

The program began with the complete organ works of Sir Ernest MacMillan (1893-1973), composer and organist, who was also conductor of the Toronto Symphony. His *Cortège Académique* was performed at a lively tempo with real conviction. The *Chorale Prelude on "In dulci jubilo"* and *Passacagia in G minor* were delivered with what one might call stately understatement, the perfect mix of confidence and restraint.

This was followed by two works by Florence Durrell Clark, her *Sarabande* and *Fantasia for Organ: "Angelus ad Virginem"* which maintained the dignified mood with a gentler touch in these stirring works.

The first half concluded with Healey Willan's *Prelude and Fugue in C minor*. This well-known piece's dark gloom created real atmosphere in the building, and was delivered with lots of breath and conviction. Afterwards Oldengarm gave a well-deserved salute to the instrument.

The second half began with *Toccata* by the RCCO Ottawa Centre's very own Gilles Leclerc, and the roaring pedal lines sang through the walls of the mostly wooden interior of the church with intensity and force.

In Gerald Bales' *Three Short Hymn Settings*, the use of a vox humanasounding stop in the Sanctuary Organ, possibly the 8' Musette, Vox Angelica, or combination of the two, introduced a grotesque and mysterious character to the concert. This interesting choice

deepened the experience, a prelude of things to come. The second movement was the piece that best captured the mystery, colour and naif wonder the building inspires, and explored the colours of the organ fearlessly and tastefully. The use of the sanctuary organ was extremely effective in this piece. The third movement brought even weirder sounds from the sanctuary division. This performance was an incredibly rich experience of a masterful work of Canadian contemporary organ music. Gerald Bales was a student of Willan's and a teacher of Leclerc's, giving the concert a fourth dimension as listeners could experience the transmission of ideas and inspiration first hand.

That aspect of the concert continued when Oldengarm next performed the powerful and pioneering *Sonata XLII* by his former professor Barrie Cabena. This works takes a page from the playbook of Jean Langlais for a wonderful romp full of parallel chromaticism, exciting new flavours and was delivered with very convincing playing.

A fitting end to a tremendous program, the final work was Rachel Laurin's *Prelude and Fugue in F minor*. Oldengarm's adroit articulation is a perfect match for this piece, making for a wonderful bridge between past form and modern sensibility. A teeth-grating out of tune F# in the pedal reed, no doubt a consequence of the wildly fluctuating temperatures and humidity in Ottawa this February, was the only mark in an otherwise cloudless concert, which finished with the piece's beautiful swells and terrifically fun ending.

For an encore, Oldengarm allowed himself to deviate from the all-Canadian program for a *Valse* by Karg-Elert, a humorous, capricious piece which, although at risk of sounding too kitsch, should be better known. With this piece Oldengarm gave a splashy demonstration his deep knowledge of the instrument, making incredibly effective use of quick changes between divisions and wildly colourful registrations. It was easy to feel that one was really present for an opportunity to hear a rare demonstration of spectacular talent.

On Saturday, Oldengarm gave a master class at Notre-Dame, and demonstrated his deep knowledge of organ music history in giving instruction to four organists. Bach was the majority of the day, as three of the four organists were looking for pointers in their preparations for the upcoming Great Bach Marathon at Woodroffe United Church on Saturday April 22nd.



It was clear that although he plays Canadian contemporary and German romantic music exceedingly well, with Bach, Oldengarm is in the realm of obsession and had all sorts of arcane and incredibly enlightening facts of historical, personal and even numerological significance about Bach's music at the tips of his fingers.

Maria Gajraj gave a wonderful performance of Bach's *Prelude and Fuge in C, BWV 514*. Alison Kranias offered the *Prelude in E-flat Major* from the second volume of Bach's *Wholtemperiertes Klavier* (Alison will play the fugue as well on April 22nd). Boris Shingarov performed *Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland, BWV 659*. Samuel Lee was the only deviation from the Bach theme, giving a great performance of Franck's *Third Choral*.

It was an illuminating afternoon, and the improvement in each participant's playing was notable. We look forward to some terrific performances at upcoming Sundays or recitals and, of course, at the Bach Marathon, April 22nd at Woodroffe United Church, 207 Woodroffe Ave, 1:30 pm – 6:00 pm. Free will donations will support the RCCO Young People's Scholarship Fund for Young Organists.
