Joshua Zentner-Barrett is in the middle of his comps and editing work for publication and is inviting us to share with him at St. Paul University.

#### From Josh:

The Anglican Studies program of the Faculty of Theology at Saint Paul University is looking forward to hosting you for a sharing session on Saturday, December 2 at 2 PM. The program was formed in 1981 as a unique partnership between the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa and Saint Paul, a Roman Catholic institution, and has been instrumental in training clergy and lay leaders in the diocese and beyond alongside Roman Catholic, Eastern Christian, and other denominational students. While programs have grown and changed over the years, the Anglican Studies program has remained a core part of the Faculty's identity.

I have been the Director of Music for Anglican Studies at Saint Paul since September 2020 where I am a part of a team that coordinates liturgy, offers workshops and events, and builds the Anglican community at the university. While much of what we do is focused on the academic and spiritual formation of students, we also believe that this program should exist to support the wider formation of Anglicans in Ottawa. We value lifelong learning! This session on December 2 is part of a vision where Anglican Studies is part of building community among musicians and organists across Ottawa. I look forward to sharing more of what we do in the program and at Saint Paul that afternoon.

Our time together will be a Playand-Share of sorts. I invite you to bring your music for Advent and Christmas, your plans and dreams for the season, and your presence for one another as we share what we're doing, encourage and support each other in our work, and grow in fellowship. The organ at Saint Paul is a two-manual Casavant with several unified ranks. Though it is not the world's best instrument, it is located in a beautiful chapel space with stunning acoustics. The organ sounds good in here! The chapel is also home to a recently acquired Kawai baby grand piano, a gift from the former St. Martin's Anglican Church to the Anglican Studies program through the diocese. This instrument is also available for your use in Play-and-Share.

Saint Paul University is made up of two buildings: De Mazenod Chapel is located in the more southern, brown brick building called Laframboise Pavilion. There is plenty of street parking (3 hours) available along Maiin Street, including in front of Laframboise. There are also two paid parking lots: one on Hazel Street and one on Main Street, next to Singing Pebble Books. The University is also reachable via public transit: you can take the #1 train to Lees station and either catch a connecting bus(#16 or #55) or walk about 15 minutes. In addition, buses #5 and 55 stop right in front of the school, while #16 ends its route on Saint Paul's north side. #56 also has a stop at Main and Lees; the University is only a 5-7 minute walk from there. And, of course, there's

lots of bicycle parking in front of the university and along Main Street.


## Pro Organo Tickets Now Available on EventBrite

Organo continues to deploy Eventbrite to promote and sell tickets for our long running concert series. Over the last year we have managed to sell at least some tickets for the last 5 concerts. We were particularly pleased to sell about half of the total tickets sold for the Maria Gajraj concert in November.

Our hope is that Eventbrite will help us reach potential new audiences and promote events as widely and effectively as possible and to keep pace with the ever-changing media environment. Selling tickets electronically also gives prospective concert goers easy options for deciding to attend the concert, perusing the program in advance, seeing promotional material on the performer, and then using simple ticket verification at the concert door.

Eventbrite is an American-based event management and ticketing website that is widely used by the arts community in Ottawa and is THE place to advertise events, manage tickets, and build and support audiences. The platform can be used for free to promote events but when ticketing options are added, there are charges applied to the processing of those transactions. We are probably familiar



with these kinds of charges for other online purchases. Although, not ideal, the charges are nominal for the services delivered.

As Ottawa Centre members and organ lovers, we can all help to promote our Eventbrite listings by going to the site, searching for our concerts (by date or type of event) and consider sharing on one or more social media platforms (Facebook, Messenger, twitter, e-mail), with friends and family. ## The Season of Advent Blue

The Season of Advent Blue is a phrase that has been coming into my mind and imagination through the days leading up to this first season of the new church year. I walk a lot, and as I walk, there is that phrase speaking into my spirit... And I am reminded that in these days leading up to Christmas, we shall display in some of our churches — for yet another year — our Advent wreaths woven with evergreens, holding three blue candles and one pink one for lighting Sunday by Sunday as we journey through this Season of anticipation.

As we light the first blue candle we shall be called, as people of faith, to share in a renewed spirit of **Hope**. The second will affirm us as God's people of faith who are called ever to search and reach out for **Peace**. In the third week of the season, we shall light the pink candle reminding us of the spirit of **Joy** with which we are gifted as God's people. And then, as we light the last blue candle, we shall be led — because God is leading us — through the season's final week to celebrate our shared anticipation of the **Love** that is

ours through Christ's coming among us. And the central candle in that wreath is white symbolizing the gift of his coming.

Indeed, in a nutshell, the Advent season can inspire us to reflect on what it meant then, now and in the future for the Word to become Flesh and dwell among us. Perhaps most importantly, it can guide us to look for what God is doing now in our lives; how we may respond and assist, and what it can mean for us to celebrate this. Thanks be to God.





## Organ Transplant for St. Stephen's

closing of a parish is always a devastating blow for a congregation, but some good can also come from it. St. Martin's Anglican Church, in Ottawa's Carlington area, held its final service on May 28, 2023. Frances Macdonnell—a

parishioner at nearby St. Stephen's Church and Organist Emerita of Christ Cathedral—said we should try to acquire the Rodgers organ from St. Martin's: it was newer and larger than the Allen organ at St. Stephen's. The corporation and parish council of St. Stephen's enthusiastically approved the idea (as well as approving a budget to acquire the organ from St. Martin's) before our rector, the Reverend Canon George Kwari went on a three-month sabbatical beginning on May 1. The Venerable Rob Davis was serving as Priest-in-Charge at St. Martin's and had grown up at St. Stephen's: his father, the Reverend Canon Eldon Davis, had served as our rector from 1962-71.

In 2004, St. Martin's Anglican
Church purchased a Rodgers electronic organ (Model T927LT) featuring 45 speaking stops over three manuals and pedal. David Dawson—organist and choir director at St. Martin's from 1995-2018—described their new organ as "enriching and elevating the eucharistic liturgy and special seasonal events such as Advent and Lent'.

A committee was formed at St. Stephen's, which I dubbed 'The Organ Transplant Committee' to make this dream become a reality. We got word that the old Rodgers organ at All Saints' Church (Westboro) was dying, so we thought that the organ from St. Stephen's should go to All Saints. The first item on the 'to do' list was to get approval from The Venerable Linda Hill, executive archdeacon of the diocese. This was received. In the spirit of giving and co-operation, no purchase price was imposed on the Rodgers organ going to St. Stephen's or the Allen organ going to All Saints: each parish paid for the cost of moving and installation.

The Organ Transplant Committee insisted that we hire professionals to do the work rather than rely on the goodwill of parishioners. This was a wise decision, ensuring that the move and installation were done to the highest standard.

July 14th was moving day: the Rodgers organ was moved to St. Stephen's and the Allen organ was moved to All Saints. The Rodgers organ was stored in the south transept while renovations were completed. With the Rodgers organ being much larger than the Allen, more room was needed for additional speakers. This included a shelf being installed over the sacristy door to hold the two 150 pound sub-woofer speakers! The organ console for the Allen had been in a pit. The Rodgers console was a little wider, and at the insistence of our service technician Gilles Bruyère, the pit was filled in and the new console sits directly on the chancel floor.

Over the next several weeks, when workers were available, the speakers for the Rodgers organ were installed and the wiring and the self-imposed deadline of

September 1st was met.

On October 8 (the Sunday of Thanksgiving weekend), the Reverend Canon George Kwari dedicated the Rodgers organ in a service filled with music. Fittingly, Frances Macdonnell accompanied

the choir's anthem Sing to the Lord of Harvest under the direction of Robert Jones, Organist and Choir Director of St. Stephen's.

On Sunday evening, November 19, we were delighted to welcome organist Matthew Larkin who performed a terrific recital on our new organ. An enthusiastic audience of 80 heard Matthew played music of Bach, Duruflé, Vierne, Parry, Howells, Keith Jarrett and Rachel Laurin. St. Stephen's has a connection with Robert Fleming: his son Richard was the rector's warden when I was hired a year ago, but sadly, he died a few weeks later. Another son, Michael, is an honorary assistant priest at St. Stephen's. Fittingly, the hymn Let There be Light, to Robert Fleming's tune Concord, was heartily sung by the audience of 80.

Matthew Larkin's superb playing, coupled with his informed commentary was enthusiastically received. Rachel's piece, Asian Legend dates from 2014 and was dedicated to Mai-yu Chan (who was in attendance).

Towards the end of the Howells (Psalm Prelude, Set 1, No. 1), a rattle was heard when the 32' Contre Bourdon was brought on. After the recital, we found the cause: a brass candle snuffer on a hook at the end of a pew beside the sacristy door!

Donations totalling around \$2,000 were received with all proceeds being forwarded to Belong Ottawa: the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa's Community Ministry's Outreach Programme.

The many compliments received indicated that hopefully more recitals can take place at St. Stephen's.

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### In Memoriam - Brian Law

revered musical director, Brian (John Taylor) Law. Conductor, organist, harpsichordist, b London 14 Apr 1943; LRAM 1963, FRCO 1963, ARSCM 1973. celebrated for leading some of New Zealand's most cherished orchestras and choirs, has passed away.

Born and educated in London, before moving to Canada in 1965 at the age of 22, Law became conductor of Ottawa's St. Matthew's (Anglican) Church men's and boys' choir (1965-80), and brought the choir to a standard of excellence comparable to that of British collegiate and cathedral choirs. He was conductor 1965-87 of the Cantata Singers of Ottawa, a chamber choir which sang regularly with the NACO, and in 1967 he became conductor of the Ottawa Choral Society. Under his direction, the latter choir has grown to 150 singers and has travelled to Italy and Spain, and participated in the 1989 International Choral Festival in Toronto. In 1971 he was chosen as the first conductor of the Ontario Youth Choir and in 1987 returned for a second season.

Law began his career as an orchestral conductor with the Ottawa Youth Orchestra in 1971 and in 1975 became conductor of the Ottawa Civic Symphony Orchestra (now Ottawa SO). In 1976 he founded the Thirteen Strings - a baroque ensemble conducted from the harpsichord. He has performed as guest conductor with the TS, NACO, Festival Singers of Canada, Victoria Symphony Orchestra, Calgary Philharmonic, CBC orchestras in Vancouver, Winnipeg and Atlantic Canada, Manitoba Chamber Orchestra, and the Barcelona SO.

His career in opera began in 1970 when he became assistant conductor and chorus master for Festival Ottawa, a position he held during the 13 years of the Festival's operation. He occupied the same position 1986-9 with the Opéra de Montréal, developing the chorus into an



ensemble which was not only noted for its dramatic and musical contribution to the operas but also explored concert choral repertoire from Palestrina to Bruckner. After a year's absence, he returned to the Opéra de Montréal in 1990.

For 14 years he was organist and Choirmaster at Ottawa's St. Matthew's Anglican Church, where he brought the men's and boys' choir to a standard of excellence comparable to that of British collegiate and cathedral choirs.

At his final concert in Ottawa, Brian was awarded the Freedom of the City.

The Brian Law Opera Scholarship was established to honour his contribution to opera in the National Capital Region.

Brian conducted all the major Canadian orchestras, and worked widely in the fields of opera and ballet. Internationally he conducted orchestras in the United States, Italy, Spain, Egypt and the BBC Singers in Britain. International festivals included Abruzzi, Italy, Barcelona, Spain and Opera at the Pyramids in Egypt.

Law was appointed the director of New

Zealand's Christchurch City Choir in 1991. Brian led the Choir from 2003, when he was asked to 'help out' over Christmas. "He forgot to stop helping and saw the Cathedral survive earthquakes and only retired after we had moved into the Transitional Cathedral in 2014."

The City's musical landscape expanded, heightened and developed enormously through his work with the City Choir, Southern Opera, and as a frequent guest conductor of the Christchurch Symphony and founding director of Cantores.

He conducted highly acclaimed seasons for Canterbury Opera, including Don Giovanni, The Magic Flute, Lucia di Lammermoor, Carmen, Tosca, and The Merry Widow.

Nationally, he conducted concerts with NZSO, the National Ballet, NZ Opera and all the regional orchestras.

For 10 years he conducted the annual summer 'Opera in the Park' and 'Starlight' concerts in the Auckland Domain.

Brian died peacefully at home on Monday. A memorial service will be held in early in 2024.

The Transitional Cathedral of Christchurch, NZ, made the announcement of the death of Brian Law on Tuesday night.

He remained a strong supporter of the Cathedral up to his death, critiquing services either in person or by watching live-streams. A spokesperson for the cathedral said at least two full generations of Cathedral Choristers and a healthy number of back row of the Choir will remember him for his musical brilliance, his humour and, on occasions, "the look" that could wither anyone at 100 paces.

"He often commented that the job at the Cathedral was like coming full circle as he was a choral director in Canada in the 1960s."

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
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## Advertising Policy

If a member wishes to place a free announcement in Around Town for an event of another organization he/she is a member of (not covered by Policy 1), the member must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted on the basis that this **extraordinary** event would be of specific interest to our members: e.g., church/choral, and/or organ/bells, **and/or the** encouragement of young organists and pianists.
- 3. If a non-member wishes to announce an event of his/her organization in Around Town **free of charge**, he/she must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.
