hristmas is coming! Some people are sewing and knitting, others are baking cookies or doing some online shopping, and many of us RCCO members are planning music, I'm sure. Some may have already started rehearsing some Advent and Christmas anthems with our choir. How do you pick out that choir music? With so much to choose from, how do you know where to start?

Most of us have old favourites, familiar music that is well-known to the choir. For something new, you might turn to your church's music library, and if it's anything like mine you could get lost in there. Where to start? Well, one of the best things I did when I started at my church was listen to one of my choir members who said I should ask a certain long-time choir member to make a list of her favourite anthems for me. This soprano singer, let's call her Belle, had been with the church for decades and sang in both the women's and SATB choir, so she knew about some good anthems in two parts as well as four. She went through several binders of anthems and filled up both sides of a page with titles. This list was invaluable: many of those anthems are now on my list of favourites, and I've had the choir sing them many times.

The list also proved useful as Belle started to struggle with confusion and memory loss. As we know, people struggling with these

mental difficulties can usually recall, without any trouble at all, songs they learned long ago. So when I knew Belle's days in the choir were numbered I pulled out some =of these old favourites of hers so she could keep singing with us a little longer, it brought her so much joy to be in the church choir.



Other times, instead of asking a choir member to sort through music, they have come to me bringing music they have heard somewhere else, or sung at another church. Take a good look at it! Sometimes it's the perfect thing, but I made the mistake once of saying yes to an anthem that really was a little too ambitious. It came off OK, but it was quite a struggle!

Of course, you can also ask colleagues or go online to get ideas. Music publishers have good websites, and nowadays you can go on YouTube and hear all sorts of church choirs singing all sorts of anthems. Whatever you find to sing this Advent and Christmas, I hope it goes well and brings you joy!

'I Don't Have It In Me'

In the last while, an organist whom I know well lamented: I don't have it in me. This lament appeared to come from the very depths of their being. Indeed, I have not heard them offer such a statement before! What I found out was that they had been asked to play what they described as 'those funny hymns' in the Sunday morning service.

On further – and may I add the words 'self-discerning?' – reflection, this individual then proceeded to offer that organists may indeed have their own well-honed and mature

musical tastes and desires. And these can support and fit in with our work settings; and indeed, contribute to the musical and spiritual development of the congregation very well. Yet, as we serve in the church, there will come those times when we find ourselves being asked to perform music that, even as this meets the needs of our congregation, or some parts of that community, would certainly not be our choice! But the music they selected is seen by the minister or choir director with whom we work as being



appropriate for this current service. Indeed, we may find ourselves asking whether we run the risk, perhaps, of misusing our powers if we dig in our heels and refuse to cooperate.

And yet there needs to be allowance in any job, for its performer to find a way of releasing the emotions that come with seeing it through. If saying for the first time, at least in a friend's hearing: *I don't have it in me!* can give vent to the unexpected emotions that such a request has released in him or her, then so be it! We surely need to take care of ourselves, and express for ourselves - and if it can help, those we are close to - the emotions that come with being out there on the job.

Thanks be to God for such opportunities to let off steam as we are in the business of working together with our leadership team!

Isabelle Demers Concert Review

sabelle Demers kicked off the first recital in the Pro Organo series on Monday, October 28th with a concert at St. Clement's Parish, sponsored by the RCCO Ottawa Centre, the Godfrey Hewitt Scholarship, and the Canadian International Organ Competition. It was held in memory of composerorganist Rachel Laurin, who served at St. Clement's from 2012-2023. Demers, who was recently named Associate Professor of Organ at McGill University, played a recital featuring works by Laurin, as well as Bach, Franck, and Vierne.

The first half began with J. S. Bach's *Prelude and Fugue in B Minor, BWV 544*, which Demers played with great ease. Although the organ at St. Clement's, Casavant op. 701, built in 1914 and expanded in 1988, is generally a Romantic instrument, the mixtures are brighter than what you would expect to find on a Casavant at the turn of the 20th century, and lend a great flexibility to the organ for playing Baroque repertoire.

Pieces one to six from Laurin's *Douze* courtes pièces, Volume 7, followed. These short works are often of a softer character, particularly these first six. Demers made great use of the expressive capabilities of this organ, often orchestrating delicate crescendos with impeccable smoothness. Franck's Chorale in E Major finished the first half. The French character of the organ really shone here, especially the Great Trompette 8' and Clairon 4' in the loudest section near the end of the work. These two stops were rebuilt in 1988 with Cavaillé-Coll tongues, which gives them a Gallic intensity rarely heard in North America and particularly suited to the Franck.

After an intermission, some members of the St. Clement's choir sang the Gregorian chants *Gaudemus* (the Introit from All Saints) and *Laeta Dies* (a Sequence for St. Benedict), which nicely introduced Laurin's *Concert Piece #5* (Tone Poem in Honour of St. Benedict on Gaudemus and Laeta Dies). This virtuosic work showcased Demers' technical mastery, which notably included extended

passages of hand-crossing. The remaining six pieces from the *Douze courtes pièces*, *Volume 7*, were then heard. The last work in this volume, *Chant Vespéral*, is imbued with a deep sense of peace, which is fitting, for this is the last piece of the last volume Rachel completed, and Vespers is likewise the evening prayer service of the Divine Office.

Extracts from Vierne's *Symphony No. 1* brought the concert to an end. The scherzo-like *Allegro Vivace* flew

along with great speed and control, and the famous *Final* was an appropriately bombastic concert-closer; Rachel played the *Final* at her last Mass as organist of St. Clement's. A lengthy standing ovation ensued, which prompted Demers to conclude with the *Fugue Triangulaire* from *Douze courtes pieces*, op. 43 as the encore.

Overall, a masterful recital by one of Canada's finest concert organists on one of the finest organs in the nation's capital.





Approval may be granted per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.
