

### **Member of the Year - Sylvain Brisson**

#### DOMINIQUE BRISSON

Sylvain Brisson grew up in Embrun, Ontario, in a musical family where almost everyone played an instrument and sang in the church choir. In 1981, he obtained a degree in Museology, at Algonquin College in Ottawa, specializing in restoration and conservation of historical artifacts. He also completed field training at Canadian Conservation Institute and National Museum of Science and Technology. He later worked in Blind River Ontario, at the Timber Village Museum, as curator.

In Fall 1981, Sylvain was hired by François Caron Incorporated, the local Casavant organs representative where he worked for many years in apprenticeship with Robert Hiller. Sylvain learned the trade of organ restoration, tuning and maintenance, and received a Certification from the Collège de l'Outaouais. He quickly became the service manager until the early 90s.

In 1993, Sylvain took over the servicing and general care of over 150 pipe organs in the region under the new Orgues S. Brisson Pipe Organs company. With his teammate Jean-François Gariépy, he basically covered the Cornwall to Belleville to Sudbury triangle but also answered many outside calls. During the last 43 years, Sylvain was happy to meet wonderful people that made him

feel part of their community. He will now spend his retirement with his wife, his two children, their spouses and two grandchildren.



Sylvain a grandi à Embrun dans l'Est ontarien. Il est de la sixième génération de Brisson d'en ce village. La musique a toujours fait partie de l'héritage familial. En 1981, il obtient un diplôme en Muséologie du Collège Algonquin, avec une spécialisation en restauration et en conservation d'artefacts. Il a aussi complété un stage pratique à l'Institut canadien de conservation et au Musée des sciences et technologies. Son premier emploi s'est fait au Timber Village Museum de Blind River en Ontario comme curateur.

À l'automne 1981, Sylvain revient à Ottawa et est embauché par la compagnie François Caron Inc où il a appris le métier d'entretien d'orgues auprès de Robert Hiller. Ceci lui a permis de recevoir une certification du Collège de l'Outaouais comme organier. Sylvain a occupé le poste de gérant des services de cette compagnie jusqu'au début des années 90.

En 1993, Sylvain reprend officiellement la compagnie sous le nom de Orgues S. Brisson Pipe Organs. Avec son collègue Jean-François Gariépy, il entretient plus de 150 orgues dans la région, soit de Cornwall à Belleville à Sudbury, tout en dépannant quelques paroisses à l'extérieur de cette zone. Pendant les 43 dernières années, Sylvain a apprécié rencontrer des personnes qui l'ont accueilli chaleureusement dans leurs paroisses. Pendant sa retraite, il prévoit voyager avec son épouse et passer plus de temps avec ses deux enfants, leurs conjoints et ses deux petits-enfants.

# Jonathan Oldengarm Concert Review

Monday, May 5th, at l'Église Saint-François d'Assise,
Jonathan Oldengarm—the Minister of
Music at Toronto's Metropolitan United
Church—played an outstanding recital to
close out the 36<sup>th</sup> season of Pro Organo.
Titled *Animals in Music*, several of the
pieces chosen referenced various animals:
from four legged creatures (cats and a
lamb) to several of our feathered friends.

The programme began with Handel's *Concerto in F Major* (nicknamed *Cuckoo and Nightingale*). The opening movement, a lyrical Largo, is followed by an Allegro, a dialogue between the cuckoo and the nightingale. The designation ad libitum is indicated in the third movement, and Oldengarm's stylistic approach

The highlight of the evening for me was Oldengarm's rendition of *O Lamm Gottes, unschuldig* (from Bach's Leipzig collection). Sparing use of rubato to highlight cadential points added to the performance. The 10 2/3' Quint in the pedal is intended to sound like a 32' pitch, and it really did under the 16' plenum in the manuals.

Denis Bédard's delightful *Cat Suite* was next on the programme. The first movement (fittingly named *Prrrelude*) opens very much like Mendelssohn's *Prelude in G major*. One could certainly visualize the cats chasing each other in the second movement, *Cats at Play*. The hautbois was used very expressively in the third movement *Catnap* as one pictured the cats yawning before the concluding *Toc-cat-a*, a fitting conclusion.



The nickname *Cat Fugue* was never used by the Domenico Scarlatti but originates from a story about how he came up with an unusual motif on which the fugue is built. (Legend has it that Scarlatti had a cat who was prone to walking across the keyboard, always curious about its sounds.) The subject of this fugue sounds like his cat walking up the keyboard and then turned around and quickly ran down the keyboard!

The second half of the recital opened with Alessandro Poglietti's *Aria* 

Allemagna a set of variations which date from 1677. Different dance forms of the period were employed in the variations, such as a canzona, allemande, courante, sarabande and gigue.

It was rather fitting that an organist and composer like Alexandre Guilmant arrange an organ transcription of *The Swan* from Camille Saint-Saëns' *Carnival of the Animals*. The serene and fluid accompaniment in the manuals contrasted effectively with the pedal's 4' Prestant singing out on the melody.

Commissioned in 1992 by the Toronto Centre of the RCCO, Larysa Kuzmenko's *Atlantis* begins with an overture that sets the mood for the work. The second section, a passacaglia – with a very active subject – builds in intensity to the full resources of the organ. The final section, an epilogue, uses some of the material from the overture as the piece comes to a quiet close.

Georg Muffat's *Toccata septima* is a fantasia-like work. It begins in the style of a French overture followed by fugal sections alternating with freer improvised style sections with the various themes all coming together to bring the piece to a majestic conclusion.

On behalf of our Centre, I would like to offer a huge thank you to the committee – chaired by Gilles Leclerc – for producing the Pro Organo series this year. A lot of time and effort goes into such an endeavour: it was a job well done.

Saturday, May 24th, two student organists and three piano students, gave a recital

at Kitchissippi United Church. **Mathéo Nadon**, a student of Robert Jones & Adrian Ross, played organ works by Johann Speth: *Magnificat Octavi Toni*, *André Raison Trio en Passacaille*, and the hymn tune *Southwell*.

Following were three pianists, scholarship winners in the recent Ottawa Piano Festival, playing works of J.S. Bach from memory. **Hanru Li** played *Little Prelude in D minor (BWV 926)*. **Heather Cai** played *Sinfonia in G Major (BWV 796)*, and **Qiran Fu** played *Prelude & Fugue in F major (BWV 880)*.

The progamme concluded with **Yi Zhou**, a student of Robert Jones, playing three organ works. The first work was *Prelude & Fugue in G Major* by Felix Mendelssohn followed by the audience singing the hymn *Good Christians All*,

Rejoice and Sing on the Hymn tune Vulpius. Yi finished with the Prelude & Fugue in B-flat major (BWV 560) attributed to J.S. Bach.

The recitalists gave a superb effort and excellent performances. Robert Jones

emceed the event and gave interesting introductions to each work that was performed. It was a most enjoyable afternoon concert for those present.

#### On Being Real

This morning, as I have settled down to write my 'Chaplain's Corner' for *Pipelines*, I do so with a fresh resolve to be *real* with all of you! In response you may be wondering, Christine, have you not been *real*, with us in your previous articles? May I assure you that I have always tried to be real, conveying, as it were, where I am at in the moment; even as I am often concerned in that reality not with myself, but with all of you with whom I am trying, sincerely, to be in touch.

But there are varying degrees of being real; and today – in my wisdom - I have

decided to take this one step further.

Not because I have seen any lack in our communications and those of others within our community, but because life at its fullest is so very real, demanding surely that we try to be authentic with the other... Indeed, each day we are challenged to act and be in touch with our neighbors – often members of our church communities where we serve in good faith – hopefully from the center of who we are. It is not always easy: indeed, it can take courage and, yes, experience to do just that.

One legitimate question may indeed be: When were we last in communication with the other from the center of who we



are as persons, and yet also appropriately within the moment with which we are being graced? We do not want to overwhelm the other with personal matters that are best shared with close friends and family. And yet, experience has certainly taught me that when the other tries, within the realities and parameters of the moment in which we find ourselves, to be sincerely authentic with me in their communication, I am offered the privilege of being touched - indeed challenged - to be authentic in return. As a result, something good unfolds between us: they are touched and, somehow, in their response convey this, in turn touching myself, nudging me to hold on to – and to offer – my sincere being in my response.

And yes, something *real* unfolds between us, encouraging us in this world where communication can often be shallow and – do I dare say it? – half baked. What we offer in the fullness of who we are as church deeply matters, and, indeed, is important to Christ Jesus who dwells at its center.

# Preparation for the Choir Training Certificate Examination

I have done several times before, I plan to offer a series of Saturday-morning workshops to prepare RCCO members for the RCCO's Certificate in Choir-Training examination, which is offered by the College each May. Quite a few of our members have taken this examination - and enjoyed it!

This is a fun examination to take! - and it hones your skills in conducting a small choir, a skill everyone needs. It involves preparing to conduct a small choir in a simple rehearsal in front of an examiner: rehearsing one hymn, one anthem, and a short psalm. These are all planned and preparedin advance: there are no rehearsal surprises! I will provide my own small choir, the Cranmer Singers, as the test choir, and they will be as helpful to the candidates as they can.

There is also a written examination, in which candidates answer three questions:

- a. Add chord symbols to a given melodic line, using Roman numerals;
- Analyze the harmony of a passage from a short anthem, and answer a few easy point-form questions about the anthem;

c. Write a short paragraph (100 words or less) on four out of ten questions on basic subjects such as: sightsinging; vocal training; conducting techniques; congregational singing; the organization, recruitment, and training of choirs; and so on.

There will also be two simple ear test questions on the day of the written examination. We will prepare approaches for all these questions in advance.

These Requirements are all for useful common-sense musical skills which we all in fact have, but which we all need to practise in order to gain confidence. And we will practise them all during the workshops in advance of the exam.

To prepare members who may be interested in taking this Certificate examination, I will provide a series of six (6) workshops on Saturday mornings through next fall and winter. In the course of these workshops, we will practise all these skills, and there will be some easy written homework, so that candidates are fully prepared for the Requirements of this examination, which results in an RCCO certificate which you can hang on the wall of your Choir Room!

The first of these six workshops will be held on **Saturday September 20**th, **2025, from 10 am until noon** at my apartment, 303-3099 Carling Avenue. I'm located on Carling Avenue just west of Bayshore Drive; there is a large visitors' parking lot directly in front of the building. Subsequent workshops will be scheduled at times to be convenient to all participants.


