

The Best Tool for the Job

hose of us with regular weekly playing obligations go through a lot of music. It is sometimes the case that, under the pressures of full-time employment, family, and just getting enough sleep, a piece may not be fully mastered by the time it is played. One of the things that often gets skipped over under these circumstances (and sometimes even when we have the time) is the important

One of the things that often gets skipped over under these circumstances (and sometimes even when we have the time) is the important task of intentionally working out fingering. We resort to basic approaches with which we are comfortable.

In most circumstances we have many choices as to which finger (tool) we could use to play a specific note (the job). But many don't make sense and we drift toward a small set of choices based on our past experiences. However, sometimes a little thought about the choice of fingering will result in a much easier approach to achieving the desired end.

Take for example, the simple ascending C major scale in the right hand. The fingering is obvious to most: 1-2-3-1-2-3-4-5. Most of us have played this scale this way 1000s of times. But this approach tends to accent the notes played by the thumb and when played over many octaves can generate lurching rhythm (3 beats and then 4 beats between thumb accents). We can spend many hours of practice to smooth out the scale - carefully controlling the amount of time each key is depressed (and on the piano, how quickly it is

depressed) in order to get an even rhythm.

Baroque performers had a different approach. I won't pretend to be an expert but I have done a little reading and little experimenting. The basic principle behind most versions of historical fingering is to use strong fingers on string beats - the best tool for the job. For the C major scale an historical fingering choice might be 3-4-3-4-3-4 (ascending, in the right hand). This generates a nice easy duple rhythm without all of the stress, concentration and practice required of the standard fingering. Give it a try if you have not done this before.

Why is this not more common? A couple of reasons. First, since the legato style of playing became common most learn the approach that allows maximum connection between notes, the first approach. Second, in order to use historical fingering one must often lift the hand off the keyboard and move it laterally (to the right in the C major scale example.) It is quite simple to learn to do this accurately and easily with a little practice. However, taking all fingers off of the keyboard, even for a brief time period can give rise to a certain level of anxiety. Under the pressure of playing those not fully mastered pieces most are not willing to further raise the level of anxiety by lifting the hand off of the keys.

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I suggest that you give alternate fingerings a try. If you can get comfortable with them, they make the creation of a rhythmic and musical performance very much simpler. But

you have to learn to use this new tool and be willing to make the decision to use it. I'm not necessarily arguing in favour of historical fingering as a performance practice (nor am I arguing against it) but I would say that it is a technique that is very useful in achieving certain musical goals

in many circumstances. When a suitable opportunity arises why not give it a try; it might be the right tool for the job and make a pressure filled task a little easier.



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
