A New Year Begins

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Welcome to the new year! As we begin a new season we have much to look forward to in the Ottawa Centre. The Pro Organo Series begins at Knox Presbyterian Church on Friday, Sept. 13 with an organ and flute recital given by Rachel Laurin and Claire Marchand. A lovely combination of instruments that think alike.

Sept. 21 will see us at the organs on Elgin Street. This may be our last chance to hear the organ at Eglise Unie de St-Marc. The organ crawl will end at the Elgin St. Diner - a chance for coffee and chatting. Several people have said that we don't have many opportunities to socialize so please do join us on Sept. 21.

We are thankful – and relieved – that Carleton University bought Dominion Chalmers United Church (no 20 story condos on this lot) and have rebuilt the Casavant organ console. On Sunday, Sept. 22nd there will be an organ recital given by Thomas Annand, Ian Bevell, James Calkin, and Jennifer Loveless. Frances Macdonnell will give a pre-concert talk at 3pm, and the recital begins at 4 pm. An optional building tour follows at 5 pm. Admission to the concert is free, with refreshments (a time to visit and chat) after the concert.

Lastly, I want to draw your attention to the organist/clergy dinner at KS on the Keys on Monday, October 28th. Our speaker is Rev. Victoria Scott, priest at St. Luke's Anglican

Church, Ottawa. Victoria was an organist/choir director before she became an Anglican priest. She will have some interesting ideas about church music in the 21st century. Also a wonderful evening to visit and chat!

It was good to see and hear Brian Law at Music and Beyond in July - at the Carleton Dominion-Chalmers Centre. Paul Halley, who was a chorister at St. Matthew's Church and is now Organist & Director of Music at All Saints Cathedral, Halifax, gave a stunning recital on the newly re-built Dominion-Chalmers organ. He and his family must leave Halifax for Ottawa right after the RCCO convention!

At the other end of the scale, what was All Saints Church in Sandy Hill is now All Saints Event Space. The organ console was put out on the sidewalk some months ago. Ottawa is a busy centre but we need you to invite choir members, church goers, non-church goers – anyone and everyone – to the concerts/events.


Saturday, September 21, 2019, 1:00 p.m.

Choir Training Certificate Workshop

Frances Macdonnell will once again offer a series of six educational workshops to prepare interested members for next spring's Choir Training Certificate exams. It's not a very difficult exam and is open to every member of the RCCO who has a little experience in working with choirs.

In this exam, candidates demonstrate their ability to plan a church choir programme, direct a short choir practice, answer some straightforward written questions on choir management and choral planning, write some simple harmony, and do some easy ear tests. The outcome of this examination is a Certificate of Proficiency in Choir Training.

The first of these workshops will be held on Saturday September 28th at Frances's apartment, 303-3099 Carling Avenue, from 10 am until noon. This location is on Carling Avenue just west of Bayshore Drive; there is a large visitors' parking lot directly in front of the building.



Let Love and Wholeness Lead Our Way

Nothing that happens in the church should be a surprise, with the exception of the sudden return of our Lord and Saviour at the Second Coming. Be prepared! It could take place at any moment!

We have organizational structures. We have many methods of communicating and consulting. We also have ways of working in new directions, being intentional about that, as well as approaches to dealing with conflict and bringing resolution.

So, when stories are told about RCCO members being treated unfairly and abruptly terminated, no matter the length of their tenure, we are all deeply saddened.

Many of us are also perplexed.

Of all people and places, sometimes the church seems to believe that it can do anything and at anytime. Employees, contractual or otherwise, can be treated poorly. Their years of service and what they have put into the music ministry can go unconsidered, even in marking important dates and providing incentives.

At times, churches ignore the new commandment Jesus gives about love. They can also ignore sensitive and transparent ways of dealing with challenging situations that may be difficult to talk about and work through, as well as employment regulations.

The resultant direction is not the preferred path. With respect to letters of offer, employment agreements, contracts, and position descriptions, it is best to

consult with an employment lawyer. When things go sour, and you are forced to hire a lawyer, that changes everything—all of the dynamics of the faith community—although it may be the only way to work through a difficult situation. Further, you may want to consider consulting a legal expert before you take on a new position, your position description and contract are being renegotiated, or you have been unexpectedly terminated.

I'm no expert regarding the above paragraph on legal matters, so you will have to do your own homework. The best professional support is to contact church musicians who have gone through this sort of thing, or find and contact an employment lawyer yourself. Again, it is unfortunate that this seems to be a common way to move in the church these days, especially in order to get people's attention and move things forward fairly and justly.

An overarching problem in the area of music ministry in the church is deeply rooted. What I continue to see lacking in the contemporary church is leadership. This includes leadership that has a "good enough" understanding of music and worship ministry, what these two significant areas of congregational life mean, and how they can work together.

For both clergy and church musicians, as well as other church employees, an appropriate place for you to go where you can talk about your problems in the congregation, with guaranteed

confidentiality, can be absent. This is also unfortunate. Some of these issues get personal, relating to leadership style, theological perspective, and personality.

In addition, in some congregations, musicians and ministry personnel can be viewed as expendable, while congregational dynamics are not, having developed over many years, so they persist without questioning.

As a clergyman, I often get the lowdown on how things are going throughout the church system. It is not perfect. Because of the unique culture of a congregation, be it small or large, rural or urban, some existing dynamics taking place can evade pastoral awareness. A congregation has its own life and momentum; its own dynamic, be it grounded faithfully or not.

One of the major concerns that we church musicians have been working on for the last thirty-five years in Canada is our integration into congregational and denominational life. When musicians are an integral part of the pastoral context and organizational structure, they can contribute to the ongoing life and work of the congregation in helpful ways. There can be ongoing conversation and dialogue.

In some situations, although clergy are on church boards for reason of providing quorum, church musicians, as employees, are not. However, regular participation through music and worship committees, or similar groups, as well as personnel

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committees, which connect with the board or church council, can also help to develop relationships.

Every church employee has a personnel file, or at least he or she should have, and participates in a yearly interview regarding wages, congregational goals, continuing education, and other matters related to the ministry relationship. Although some church musicians are volunteers, a similar protocol can be helpful for all concerned.

Another perspective I would like to add is a point about ongoing psychological and spiritual care. As anyone working in the church these days knows, the context for congregational ministry is rapidly changing and there are many challenges.

More than ever, it is important to take care of yourself as a church leader. This is not at all selfish; rather, it is a required part of your ministry in the church: providing safe and effective use of self (SEUS).

Find a counsellor, spiritual director, or psychotherapist. Do your own work, so that your personal stuff, including emotions and strong perspectives, or whatever it may be, does not leak into the congregation unnecessarily. You will be a much better leader if you take care of yourself. Your congregation and colleagues will also benefit.

In all of this, one of the things that churches, including their musicians and ministers, often lose sight of is that we are a disciple community. We are a community of Christ. We know in particular ways the incarnational presence of God. As the visit of God made flesh in Jesus proves, relationships are key.

The Gospel of Luke (Revised Standard Lectionary, Year C) is a good resource. The writer suggests that the mighty be brought down and the lowly raised. He puts a new perspective out there. This involves those on their high horses getting off them. This also involves raising what was thought to be

irrelevant, or unrelated, to a new status.

Most of all, such a biblically grounded theological perspective involves going where we have not yet gone before as a whole people of God, and holding everything together in creative tension, rather than being off-balance, pulled to one side.

The politics we want to engage in the contemporary church are the values belonging to God's emerging kingdom of heaven on earth. These are not about name-calling, or pointing a finger, where one is better than the other, right or wrong, or seeking retaliation because of what has been done to you.

Rather, a major perspective in the faith community today considers being the whole people of God and acting like it. The goal is wholeness, with individuals, faith communities, and denominations, including supportive organizations.

I know what I am saying, or putting out there for discussion, cannot take the pain away from those who have experienced extremely challenging employment situations in the church. Clearly, over the years, musicians and clergy have been hurt badly by congregations and their denominations. The opposite is also true.


However, how we respond to these circumstances, and how we work proactively, I strongly believe, can make a difference in how we all move together into the future.

Let us make our loving and merciful actions speak louder than our words. Let us encourage positive relationship building, face-to-face conversations, create support and provide understanding, listening deeply to the other, perhaps without saying anything, and with an aim to build up the faith community.

Most of all, let us be a people of resurrection and new life, where the Holy Spirit of the risen and ascended Christ empowers every aspect of our way, truth and life.

Yes, the second coming could happen at any moment, but meanwhile, let us be ready by making the major surprise in the church today our courage and willingness as church musicians to go beyond the call of duty, pay attention to the details of our life together in congregations, and work toward healing and wholeness.

Let us attend to the development of healthy relationships and spiritual wellness, taking a small step in moving from our comfortable pew, music stand or pulpit, organ or keyboard bench, to an unconditional, all-embracing love.
