Pro Organo Concert Poster

pring is here and with it comes our last Pro Organo concert: on May 13 at Saint-François-d'Assise we'll get to hear Vincent Boucher play works by Bach, Scarlatti and Handel.

Do you ever wonder what's going on behind the scenes of Pro Organo, who is making this all happen? Karen Holmes perhaps? Well, Karen did organize this concert series almost single-handedly for many years, contacting artists, securing venues, writing grant applications, and organizing ticket sales. But a few years back Gilles Leclerc stepped up to give Karen a hand and he is now chair of the Pro Organo committee. Along with Ian MacKay's help and with the support of Karen's knowledge and expertise, they manage this series of four concerts we are blessed with every year.

Running the series is challenging, especially from the financial perspective. There are artists to pay, rental fees for the venues (which have increased significantly in recent years) and, like many institutions, we see the number of people coming to our events declining. On top of all that we don't have the arts grant we used to get every year.

What to do? Well, the team has had some good ideas that are starting to bear fruit. We are now posting Pro Organo concerts on **EventBrite**, an on online platform where you can buy concert tickets with a few clicks.

There are also discussions underway with potential partners like Music & Beyond and the Canadian International Organ Competition, and plans are in the works for the CIOC to be a co-sponsor of one of our concerts next season. We are also having discussions among ourselves about what are the best venues — should we keep having concerts in downtown, central locations, or out in suburban communities? And when is the best time for a concert — perhaps a Sunday or Saturday matinée would be better attended? If you have any ideas let us know, we are always happy to hear suggestions from our members about artists and venues, and we are also happy to hear if you would like to help out at a concert.



Keep an eye out for next-season's flyer, we have some great organists lined up, and see you on the 13th at St-François d'Assise!

Member of the Year: Deirdre Piper

DONALD MARJERRISON

DEIRDRE JANE PIPER (originally David John*)

I was born during the middle years of the Second World War to staunch Baptist parents, my mother being half Welsh and half Cornish, my father being wholly English serving at the time in the Royal Signals Regiment in Europe. At the end of the war my mother and I settled on the Isle of Wight - that being the home of my father and his family. There was always music at home: my father was a fine amateur solo baritone and also choral director at the church, and my mother's younger brother (who lived just over the water in Southampton) was a professional organist with whom I studied for several years in my teens. During my high school years I fell in love with Physics and Mathematics – I taught myself the essentials of calculus long before it was even mentioned in math class!

At the age of eighteen I received a state scholarship (based on exam papers in both mathematics and music) to enable me to study at any university in Britain free of charge. I chose to study music at the University of Manchester – along with organ and cello at the Royal College of Music – completing GRSM and ARMCM diplomas, followed by my Bachelor of Music degree in 1965. I then proceeded directly to studies for a doctorate in the area of electronic music (as it was then



known), completing a thesis having to do with a critical musical, technical and aesthetic comparison of the then two dominant forms: musique concrète in Paris and elektronische Musik in Cologne. During my research I spent a summer studying at the electronic music studio at the University of Toronto – my first introduction to life in Canada!

I received my doctorate in 1968, and spent two years thereafter setting up an electronic music studio and teaching at the University of Manchester followed by a year as Music lecturer

at Huddersfield Polytechnic before receiving an invitation, in 1971, to join the Music faculty at Carleton. My move to Ottawa in 1972 coincided with another enormously significant event: my marriage to Christine! We settled most happily in Ottawa – she undertaking studies and working in the area of social work before responding several years later to a call to ministry, and we both raising a family of four children. For me, Carleton offered very little in the way of performance opportunities (my work there was almost entirely academic), and I very soon undertook additional work as church organist and choir director, as well as occasional work as a chamber music pianist – thereby creating a much needed balance in my musical life.

As a church organist I very quickly, and happily, became involved with the RCCO. During my many years as organist/choir director at St. Stephen's Presbyterian and St. Matthias Anglican churches I took an active role in RCCO affairs both locally and nationally: I served as president of the Ottawa Centre (2007-2009) and as a member of the National Council.

God's Gift on a Park Bench

It was so special last weekend on that sunny afternoon to sit on a park bench in the gardens of the Mapleview Estate in Westboro. I drank in the sight of yellow daffodils, fluttering and dancing in the breeze! * And they were accompanied by low growing scilla plantings; their deep blue flowers contrasting so strikingly with that daffodil yellow. As well, the brownred foliage of bleeding hearts, not yet in flower, was interspersed among them, offering a wonderful backdrop to this gift of Springtime.

As your chaplain, and indeed as someone close to two organists within my family, might I be bold enough to suggest that such a verdant scene can speak deeply into our creativity. Indeed, spring growth and all it symbolizes, speaks to the new territories that beckon us as leaders, musical and pastoral. Musically, this might include exploring new repertoire for choir and organ, perhaps beginning with discovering new hymns. Pastorally it could mean trying to be present to others in fresh ways. All

Anne Laver Concert Review

last organ recital I heard at On Friday, April 5th, Ottawa residents were treated to a fine recital by Anne Laver at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. The Associate Professor of Organ and University Organist at Syracuse University's Setnor School of

Music offered a varied programme that explored heroism through music. The repertoire ranged from familiar works by Buxtehude, Bach and Franck to newer works by Asriel Davis, Connor Chee and Rachel Laurin.

Dr. Laver opened with the spirited Variations on Solid Rock by Asriel Davis, an alumnus of Syracuse University. The work consisting of five variations – is based on William Bradbury's 1863 hymn tune Solid Rock. It was originally an improvisation by Davis at his master's degree recital in 2022 which he then wrote down. The variations ranged from a syncopated chordal treatment, to soloing out the melody in the tenor voice on the Great trumpet, to the use of the Swell strings and then concluding with a flurry very similar to the hymn variations of Denis Bédard.

This was followed by Dieterich Buxtehude's *Praeludium in C major*. The improvisatory style of the prelude was captured with stylistic ornamentation. An allowance for the room's acoustic, especially in the flourishes in the Prelude, added to the excitement. A nice, bright tempo for the Chaconne brought the work to a rousing conclusion. And, of course, the Guilbault-Thérien organ at St.

Andrew's is so well-suited to this piece.

Though Clara Schumann did not compose for the organ, it was a delight to hear two of her *Opus 16 piano preludes and fugues (G minor and B-flat major)* that Anne Laver transcribed for the organ.



The first half of the recital ended with a fine reading of César Franck's *Pièce héroïque*. The dark opening theme in B minor is contrasted by the second section in B major, effectively punctuated with a timpani-like motive in the pedals. I am always moved by the triumphant conclusion, and tonight was no different.

ROBERT JONES

Judith Bingham's St. Bride, Assisted by the Angels was composed in 2000, after a difficult time in her life. It begins with a gradual crescendo depicting a sunrise before clouds and night creep in. The middle section depicts St. Bride

(a Celtic goddess) being flown back in time, which gives way to a calm conclusion.

Bach's *St. Anne Fugue* began with a full plenum (including a 16') on the Great. The second section was played on the Positiv and the final section, played with a dance-like pulse and articulation, was greatly appreciated by the audience with extended applause.

Navajo pianist and composer Connor Chee (born 1987) is known for combining his classical piano training with his Native American heritage. His first organ piece, *Hózhó*, dates from 2022. It begins and ends with a dialogue between the Swell and Great, while the middle section features the melody in the pedal.

The programme closed with Rachel Laurin's exciting *Étude héroïque* which begins with a jubilant introduction that gives way to an impressive pedal solo. The humour and joy we experienced with Rachel

was evident in this composition and was conveyed so effectively by Laver. The audience was quick to give Dr. Laver a well-deserved standing ovation at the conclusion of this piece, indicating their appreciation for a recital that was played with great accuracy, warmth and passion.

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
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Advertising Policy

- 1. Any Ottawa Centre member may announce his/her event on the Around Town section of the newsletter free of charge if **he/she is** the coordinator, conductor, **soloist**, or organist/accompanist of the event.
- 2. If a member wishes to place a free announcement in Around Town for an event of another organization he/she is a member of (not covered by Policy 1), the member must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted on the basis that this **extraordinary** event would be of specific interest to our members: e.g., church/choral, and/or organ/bells, **and/or the** encouragement of young organists and pianists.
- 3. If a non-member wishes to announce an event of his/her organization in Around Town **free of charge**, he/she must make a written request to the RCCO Centre Executive for approval of that one specific event. Approval may be granted per Policy 2; in most circumstances, however, we would expect the Organization to pay as per the rates set out by the Centre for advertising.
